Thoughts from the Pastor's Desk ...

Dear friends of Blessed Trinity,

As we meditated briefly last week on the Collect for the Mass, our prayer continues to deepen and be enriched. Celebrating the great mystery of God's dynamic love within Himself, that of the Most Holy Trinity, Holy Mother Church proposes for our contemplation this week the great gift that is Love Incarnate, the Most Blessed Sacrament. In the abundance of God's love, we are invited into a share of His very life, Body & Blood, Soul & Divinity. Today we celebrate Corpus Christi, the Blessed Sacrament of His True Presence.

The Collect for this Sunday's Mass (as you can find each week in the header on the preceding page) collects our prayers and personal intentions into one proclaiming

O God, who in this wonderful Sacrament have left us a memorial of your Passion, grant us, we pray, so to revere the sacred mysteries of your Body and Blood that we may always experience in ourselves the fruits of your redemption. Who live and reign with God the Father in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever.

As always concluding with the trinitarian formula of the reign of God, who is Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, this prayer orients us in the mystery of our relationship with Him by virtue of His generous gift. By His gift and our disposition, humble and free, God extends to us the great joys and graces of His divine love. While the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit are complete and perfect in their love, it is by His Divine Mercy that we merit to be sharers in that same profundity of love. Through the Most Blessed Sacrament of His Body and Blood, you and I can be fed on the life of God Himself.

The dynamism of divine love is an invitation extended to you and I, capable of loving, being loved, and love itself. Through the Most Holy Eucharist, you and I become sharers in the very flesh and blood, soul and divinity of Christ. In the salvific act of the Cross, our Blessed Lord poured forth His whole self and, having already united Himself to us in the humanity of our earthy flesh, now effected our reconciliation with the divinity of the Heavenly substance of God. As such we can raise our prayer to the Father robustly and eagerly

Look, we pray, upon the oblation of your Church and, recognizing the sacrificial Victim by whose death you willed to reconcile us to yourself, grant that we, who are nourished by the Body and Blood of your Son and filled with his Holy Spirit, may become one body, one spirit in Christ.

In Holy Communion, from the pierced side of Christ and His exposed Heart, you and I can feast on the love of God. A miracle, no less than Heaven itself.

Most Holy Trinity, I adore You! My God, I love you in the Most Blessed Sacrament! Fr. Pierz



History of Corpus Christi Processions. In the fourteenth century, the custom first developed of carrying the Blessed Sacrament in splendid procession through the town after the Mass on Corpus Christi Day. This was encouraged by the popes, some of whom granted special indulgences to all participants. The Council of Trent (1545-1563) solemnly approved and recommended the procession on Corpus Christi as a public profession of the Catholic faith in the Real Presence of Christ in the Holy Sacrament. By tradition, Catholics take part in a procession through the streets of a neighborhood near their parish following Mass. The Blessed Sacrament is placed in a monstrance and is held aloft by a member of the clergy during

the procession. After the procession, parishioners return to the church where Benediction takes place. (CatholicCulture.org)

OUR FAITH.

CORPUS CHRISTI. This Sunday we celebrate the *Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ*—also known as *Corpus Christi*. The Latin words translate to "Body of Christ."

Unique Feast. This day honors the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist. It is one of the few celebrations that does not commemorate an event in the life of Jesus or Mary. Instead, it is dedicated to the fundamental belief of Catholicism — Jesus' sacramental presence in the consecrated bread and wine. The feast of Corpus



Christi is one of only five occasions of the year in which a diocesan bishop is not to be away from his diocese unless for a grave and urgent reason.

Corpus Christi is one of only a handful of feasts that was originally recommended by parishioners. Juliana of Liège, a 13th-century Norbertine canoness, longed for a feast day outside of Lent to honor the Eucharist. After receiving several visions of Christ, she petitioned her bishop to institute the day which eventually spread to nearby cities and towns. On August 11, 1264, Pope Urban IV issued the papal bull *Transiturus de hoc mundo*. It declared Corpus Christi as a feast day throughout the entire Latin Rite. This was the very first papally sanctioned universal feast in the history of the Latin Rite. The pontiff celebrated the first solemnity in Orvieto, the town where he was then residing. He ordered the famous corporal with traces of the Eucharistic Bolsena Miracle* that had occurred in 1263, be kept in Orvieto Cathedral — where it still is today.

St. Thomas Aquinas' Texts. Pope Urban IV asked one of the greatest theologians of history, St Thomas Aquinas — who at that time was accompanying the Pope in Orvieto — to compose the texts of the liturgical office for this first feast. They are masterpieces, in which poetry expresses perfectly the theology. These texts give praise and gratitude to the Most Holy Sacrament, while the mind, penetrating the mystery with wonder, recognizes in the Eucharist the Living and Real Presence of Jesus, of his Sacrifice of love that reconciles us with the Father, and gives us salvation.

Curiously, the successors of Urban IV did not uphold the decree and the feast was suspended until 1311 when it was reinstated by Clement IV at the Council of Vienne. (MassExplained.com)

*Eucharistic Bolsena Miracle. One day in 1263, while a priest was consecrating the bread and the wine, he was overcome by strong doubts about the Real Presence of the Body and Blood of Christ in the sacrament of the Eucharist. A few drops of blood began miraculously to ooze from the consecrated Host, thereby confirming what our faith professes, dispelling all doubt.

OUR YOUTH.

WHY YOU SHOULDN'T MISS SUNDAY MASS ON SUMMER VACATION.

Summertime is just about here. It's tempting to skip Sunday Mass while relaxing on the beach, but summer vacation doesn't exempt us from going to church.

When traveling away from home to enjoy a relaxing time of vacation, it can be tempting to "forget" to attend Mass on Sunday. We may want to sleep in on Sunday, or there might not be a convenient Mass time and we don't want to interrupt our activities.



Whatever excuse we may come up with, vacation seems much simpler if we skip the Sunday obligation. **However, God doesn't see it this way.**

The current <u>Code of Canon Law</u> confirms the Sunday obligation and states, "On Sundays and other holy days of obligation, the faithful are obliged to participate in the Mass." This means that any Catholic who is able to attend Mass must make every reasonable effort to be there.

At times there may be <u>exceptional circumstances</u> that could dispense a person from attending Mass. For example, if the island you're traveling to doesn't have a Catholic church, it would be unreasonable to expect you to find a Mass. But opting to skip an available Mass in favor of **enjoying time on the beach is not a legitimate reason to miss Sunday Mass.**

Time for God. The reason why the Church is so insistent on this issue is that we need to make time for God on Sundays, worshiping in the way that *He* designed. While it may be easier to skip Mass on Sunday when traveling, we would be sacrificing the wellspring of grace that God wants to give to us **in every Sunday Eucharist.**

Above all, don't see the obligation to Sunday Mass as an imposition, but as an invitation to a deeper relationship with Jesus Christ. (aleteia.com)

Make it Memorable. Is there an historic church nearby your vacation spot? Learn about its history, meet the priest and deacon. Don't just attend, but immerse yourself into the experience. Do a little research before you go. Is there a church by the water? Is there one with beautiful lawns and gardens to walk through? Does it have an unique history? If they have a coffee social afterwards, be sure to stop by to meet parishioners, learn what some of their programs are to share with our parish and always bring back a bulletin for us. Bring back 2 bulletins if you can—one to post on the Parish Bulletin Board and one to share with the grateful Blessed Trinity Parish Bulletin Editor! Let's see how many bulletins we can collect over the summer!



DAY TRIP SPOTLIGHT: The National Shrine of The Divine Mercy. Located in nearby Stockbridge, Massachusetts (just a 75 minute drive) this beautiful Catholic Shrine is nestled on 375 acres of land in the beautiful Berkshire hills in Western Mass. The name of the property is called "Eden Hill" because of its natural beauty. The Shrine is usually open 365 days a year, including all holidays and holy days. The priests and brothers of the Congregation of Marian Fathers of the Conception of the Most Blessed Virgin Mary have resided on Eden Hill in Stockbridge, since June 1944.

History: The property was purchased in 1855, and had several wealthy owners and schools. In 1943, Fr. Joseph Luniewski, superior of the Marian House in Washington, D.C., sent a young priest, Fr. Walter Pelczynski, MIC, a native of Adams, Massachusetts, to find a residence suitable for a home for those preparing for religious life. With the help of the pastor of St. Stanislaus Kostka Church in Adams, and with the assistance of family members and friends, the Marians purchased Eden Hill on November 24, 1943.





OUR HERITAGE.

STAINED GLASS: BLESSED SACRAMENT CHURCH SANCTUARY

The set of window panels by the choir section pair well together. This week we will learn about the beautiful stained glass panel on the left that depicts Jesus giving Peter the Keys to the Kingdom of Heaven.



This window celebrates how Christ built His church upon Saint Peter. At the top of the panel, you'll see three buildings encircled in clouds representing "heaven" sitting on top of a very large "rock" or mountain. Building a structure on sand makes a poor, weak foundation, but building on top of rock is a solid, trusted foundation.

Jesus Christ is the foundation of the Catholic Church, but it was through Saint Peter's love for Him and recognition of who Jesus really was, that Jesus founded His church. The Catholic Church was founded on love and faith in Jesus Christ, the son of the living God.

"I will give you the Keys of the Kingdom of Heaven; whatever you bind on earth will be bound in Heaven, and whatever you loose on Earth will be loosed in Heaven." Matthew 16:19

Jesus gave Peter "the keys of the kingdom of heaven." A key was a badge of authority and then as now was used to open doors.

Saint Peter was made the first Pope of the Catholic Church, and Jesus himself gave him power, position and authority, especially for the "binding and loosening" of sins, marriages and leadership of his church. The concept of "binding and loosing" found in Matthew 16:19 was commonly used among the Jewish people in relation to the authority of the rabbis to forbid and permit certain practices. Jesus gave Peter and the apostles authority over both the doctrine and practices of the first-century church. Through the leading of the Holy Spirit, (see stained glass on right with Peter and John) they would be given wisdom to know what to forbid and what to permit.

Just as Jesus laid His hands on Peter in this window, Saint Peter in turn laid his hands on his successor, giving the successor this same authority, who then laid hands on his successor, and so forth continuing in an unbroken line from Saint Peter to the present day Pope Francis. This is called the succession of the popes. The popes then lay hands on our bishops, who in turn lay hands on every priest that is ordained. This authority and power came directly through Jesus Christ himself.

The beautiful scripture at the bottom of this panel reads:

"As the Father has sent Me, so I am sending you." John 20:21

As their Advocate and Comforter, the Holy Spirit would remain with them and in them forever, just as He does today in the life of everyone who trusts in Jesus. After Jesus ascended into heaven, the Holy Spirit remained with His disciples (depicted in the stained glass window on right) and they came to know Him better. (acatholic.org)


