Thoughts from the Pastor's Desk ...

Dear friends of Blessed Trinity,

During this month of June, dedicated to the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus, we are invited into the humility of a merciful God and the dynamism of His divine love. God is Love and He invites us into the mystery of that love, not according to our own conception, but according to His revelation. The Lord our God reveals to us the opportunities and the workings of His love.

One such opportunity is our weekly encounter at Holy Mass. Each and every Sunday (and its vigil), we are invited to witness and bear witness to the gift of divine love. We encounter God's living word. We receive His sacramental presence. We engage His bounty of graces. God is love and He invites us each week to participate in the great sacrifice (*sacro-facere*) of love which makes us holy. Holiness is not perfection in some sanctimonious or activist sense; it is the openness and configuration of our deepest selves to divine love, active and engaged in us and through us by God's invitation and our humble perseverance.

Opportunities for holiness abound. Encounters for witness to divine love are ever present.

In the Gospel today, Jesus declares "Everyone who acknowledges me before others I will acknowledge before my heavenly Father" (Mt. 10:32). The gift of divine love, incarnate in the person of Jesus Christ, becomes a mandate and duty. To come to know Jesus Christ means also that we make Him known. The gift of divine love received is a gift that itself must be shared. Such is the dynamism of divine love: we enter into the exchange of love that is the hallmark of the Blessed Trinity itself. Acknowledging the Son, we are acknowledged before the Father. Witnesses to divine love, we bear that witness and enter that mystery all the more.

Our encounters therefore cannot remain solitary ones. The action of grace effected in us and through us by Christ's sacrifice of the Mass cannot be contained to a few moments on a Sunday. Our encounters must lead to accompaniment. Our encounters must lead to an ongoing exchange and engagement in the witness of divine love every day of the week, every moment of our being.

I invite you, dear friends, to help build a parish of encounter and accompaniment. May our Sunday Masses, our charitable actions, our daily encounters, our shared moments, our being the Church of Greenfield, lead us to continue the journey of holiness and the witness of divine love. May our parish, each and every one of us, work together along the way and lead us to the heart of God Himself.

Most Holy Trinity, I adore You! My God, I love you in the Most Blessed Sacrament!

CATHOLIC 101: WHAT IS THE COLLECT PRAYER? The "Collect" (pronounced "call' ect") is a short thematic prayer consisting of 5 parts that concludes the opening rites of the Mass. The Collect invites people to pray in silence for a moment, and then offers a prayer to God that is drawn from the readings or feast of the day, or the purpose for which the Mass is being offered. The word "Collect" comes from the Latin phrase *ecclesia collecta*, which means that it is a public prayer prayed by and for the assembled church. Each week's **Collect** is found at the top of page 2. Breaking down the 5 parts of this prayer using this week's prayer are:

Invocation: O Lord

Acknowledgment/Description of God: Your holy name

Petition/Request:...You never deprive of Your guidance those You set firm on the foundation of Your love.

Aspiration/Desired Result: ...that we may always revere and love Your holy name

Conclusion/Doxology: Through our Lord Jesus Christ, Your Son, who lives and reigns with You in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever. *(CatholicHerald.org)*

OUR FAITH.

NATIVITY OF JOHN THE BAPTIST.

This weekend we celebrate the *birth of John the Baptist*. John the Baptist is highly unusual among the Saints: **He is** the only person besides Mary and Jesus whose birthday is celebrated instead of his day of death. That's because he was "filled with the Holy Spirit even from his mother's womb" (*Luke 1:15*). Jesus himself declared that "of all those born of women," there was none greater than John the Baptist, the prophet chosen to prepare the way for the



Lord. Saint John had the privilege of baptizing Jesus, marking the beginning of his public ministry. He was a heroic prophet who was also humble enough to declare that he was unworthy to tie the strap of Christ's sandal (John 3:30).

Christians have traditionally honored his feast day on **June 24** with distinctive customs.

The Nativity of John the Baptist coincides with the feast of Midsummer, or the Summer Solstice. Church leaders wanted to "Christianize" a pagan feast, but most likely it is because his birthday falls six months before Christ's birth celebrated December 25.

There is great theological significance to St. John's birth coinciding with the summer solstice: Christ is the "light of the world" (John 8:12) and John famously said of Christ, "He must increase; I must decrease" (John 3:30). After this feast, the days get progressively shorter until Christ's birth, when they begin to get longer again.

The birth of St. John the Baptist was a high holy day for much of Church history. It was called "the summer Christmas", and Christians marked the day with festivals, parades, and many other celebrations. These customs have fallen by the wayside in some places, but they remain a beautiful way to celebrate this special feast.

In some European cultures, the Solemnity of the Birth of St. John the Baptist is often combined with earlier pre-Christian customs such as building bonfires and other customs associated with the Summer Solstice. (aleteia.org)





History: Originally the home of Dr. Thomas and Mrs. Alys Enders, this classic 20th Century Arts and Crafts estate has been the home to a ministry of healing and

hope for over 70 years. In 1954, Mrs. Alys E. Enders donated her beloved estate on Enders Island to the Society of St. Edmund, which is a Roman Catholic religious community of priests and brothers with a rich history of pastoral ministry, education, spiritual renewal, and social justice dating back to the 19th century France. Since that time, Enders Island has offered a respite for retreats, residents, and visitors alike. It welcomes all to refresh their minds, hearts, and spirits along peaceful prayer walks,

indoor and outdoor chapels, sacred art studios, and gathering places for fellowship honoring Mrs. Enders' wish for the Island to be preserved and to provide a home for religious and charitable purposes. *(EndersIsland.org)*

Bonfires. A bonfire is the most essential way to honor this feast. These "St. John's fires" burn brightly all over the world as a reminder of the light Christ brings. And it's a wonderful excuse to toast marshmallows.

An Outdoor Feast. Fittingly for the time of year, dining al fresco—or eating outdoors, is customary on St. John's day. Plan a picnic. Have a barbeque. And head to your backyard to pick flowers and branches to create a crown where in some countries, it's traditional to wear a flower crown or leaf crown on this day.

Splashing Water. Going swimming or splashing friends with water is a nod to the great Baptist. Water guns or water balloons would be a fun twist on this interpretation!

Songs and Poems. Singing folk songs and hymns is a heartwarming tradition on this special feast day. After all, "He who sings prays twice!"

Dancing. Jumping over the campfire is an old custom on this day, however, **dancing around the bonfire** is a safer alternative. Folk dances are traditional on this day, expressing the joy that Christ and his saints bring. *(aleteia.org)*

How Do You Choose a Godparent or Confirmation Sponsor?

Choosing these important life long roles should never be a passive or quick decision based on which friend or relative happens to be available that Sunday, but rather it is choosing someone to play an active role throughout your child's lifetime. Prayer is the first step as you start your search. Asking the Lord who His choice of Godparent or Sponsor, or asking Him to make it apparent to your own heart who will take on the role well.

How to Choose? This is not an easy task, but it is crucial to ensure the person you choose will take on the role and not neglect it. Carefully consider how this person has lived his/her own life. Have they sought to have a deeper relationship with the Lord, even in their own imperfections and flaws? Have they handled trials and stormy seasons in a godly manner? Are they honest, trustworthy, and do they have an intentional heart? Lastly, would you trust your child to learn and grow from their influence?

Who is Eligible? Not just anyone can be a Godparent or a Confirmation Sponsor. There is specific criteria that the Catholic Church requires candidates to meet in order to qualify. (These are found on the Godparent/Eligibility Form on opposite page.)

Meeting with Priest. Once a Godparent/Sponsor is selected, the next important step is for you as parents (and often Godparents/Sponsors) to meet in person with your Priest. He will discuss this sacred role by answering your questions and asking you questions to be sure there is a full understanding of the importance of the promises that will be made on behalf of the recipient. You may even attend a pre-Baptism course if one is available.

Lifetime Roles. Godparents chosen for *Baptism* make a pledge on behalf of the child to renounce Satan, to believe in God and the Church, and to guide the child into a life of faith and devotion. The *Sacrament of Confirmation* Sponsors pledge to help guide them into adulthood, and to give them the skills needed to face life's challenges and to help strengthen their faith in God and the church. By taking this pledge, they are accepting the responsibility of nurturing them in the Catholic Faith and be a responsible role model for them.

The role of a Godparent or Sponsor is to encourage a child to know, love, and serve God well. Being purposeful in choosing noble and trustworthy candidates, is not something to be taken lightly, but becomes one of the greatest gifts that can be given to a child. 5 Ways to Be an Amazing Godparent or Sponsor.

Pray for Them. Pray for them. Pray with them. What a great reason to renew your regular prayer life!

Take Them to Church. If you live nearby, count your blessings, and be in their life as they grow. Help celebrate milestones. Go with or take them to church. In worship and out of worship, share how God is present in your life and what your faith means to you, as appropriate for the child's age and context.

Read Bible Stories Together. Know their favorite Bible stories or scripture passages, and share yours with them. Ask open-ended questions and be willing to listen to their answers. Buy a Bible for them as well as books for Christmas and Easter.

Be a Good Example. Children watch how we live our lives, and will see it as an example of how to carry out their own lives. This even comes down to the words you speak. Are your words of encouragement, positivity and faith? Or are they of complaining, hopelessness, or harshness. Much of a child's perspective of the Church will come from how they see other Christians living. Help them to learn from their own mistakes and not pass personal judgment for their failures. You don't have to be perfect but instead provide an authentic, sincere, real, and honest way of living in what it looks like to follow Christ daily.

Keep in Touch With Them — Especially on a Baptism or Confirmation Anniversary. If you live far away, you can still be active and engaged. Send cards, texts, or Facebook messages on special occasions. that remind you of the special relationship between Godparent/Sponsor and child. Check in, share prayers, tell them you love them and are *always there* for them. (Online sources include Crosswalk.com, Scripture Catholic.com, BuildFaith.org)

To be chosen as a Sponsor for Baptism or Confirmation is a great honor that carries with it great responsibility. It is your role to help form the candidate for Baptism or Confirmation in the Catholic Faith,

and/or to assist their parents, who are the primary educators of the faith, to be a good role model, and to inspire them to live an authentic Catholic Christian life.

- 1. Sponsors must be at least 16 years of age.
- 2. Sponsors must be Catholics who have received all Sacraments of Initiation (are baptized and confirmed, and have received first communion).
- 3. Sponsors must lead a life "in harmony with the faith;" this, must be a registered and active member in their parish, attending Mass regularly; and if married, must be in a valid Catholic Marriage.

4.	Sponsors must be someone other than the child's parents. (cf. 874)
