Thoughts from the Pastor's Desk ...

Dear friends of Blessed Trinity,

The encounter of Jesus and the Samaritan woman at the well in today's Gospel is the relationship you and I are privileged to have each and every day. During the hottest part of the day (it was about noon), when we feel most wearied by the day's labors and perhaps most alone in the esteem of others, an opportunity to meet the Lord Jesus is presented. Christ Jesus can meet us when we least expect it and when we most need it.

In that biblical encounter, Jesus begins by asking for a drink of water. A seemingly simple request, but, in this scene, one full of cultural and social implications. The woman is taken aback as she has been formed by the habits of her society, beaten down by her life's experiences, and dejected by her hopes for tenderness, love, and life. Yet, here she meets Jesus.

In His being present to her, our Blessed Lord does not poll the ills of cultural ethics. He does not promote a political viewpoint. He does not ordain a social agenda. He simply meets her. Personally.

Living in a civilization and society as our own, rising and advanced in so many ways, we can often fall duped to the idea that great social constructs, appealing cultural norms, faceless humanitarian programs, ever-artificial intelligences, and ever-expanding global technologies are all deep wells of human knowledge and ingenuity solving our problems and satisfying all needs. Yet, the Lord meets us personally.

"Everyone who drinks this water will be thirsty again; but whoever drinks the water I shall give will never thirst; the water I shall give will become in him a spring of water welling up to eternal life" (Jn 4:13-14).

Dear friends, let us go out to meet the Lord! Let us be ready to welcome Him when He comes! An encounter with the living God is open to us always. Eternal life is knowing and living in Christ now and forever. In Spirit and truth, He is not an unknown being or distant deity, but One who comes to us in Person, that is, Body and Soul. He is the Person of Jesus Christ. Flesh and Blood. Spirit and Truth! We can meet Him!

In our prayer and sacrifice, in our praise and worship, may our hearts and minds be always directed toward this personal encounter with the Lord. In our daily work and active charity, may our encounters with one another, neighbors and strangers alike, be a living reflection and profound recognition of our baptismal duty and immersion into the Mystical Body of Christ.

Jesus meets us personally. Let's not be afraid to meet Him personally. To meet Him in prayer and sacrament, body and soul. Let's not be afraid to encounter one another personally, in spirit and truth, in Christ Himself!

MARCH: THE MONTH OF SAINT JOSEPH. How to pray the Rosary of St Joseph. He is one of the most

popular saints of Christianity, with countless devotions to him. One such devotion is the Rosary of St. Joseph that uses the regular beads of the Marian rosary but substitutes various prayers and mysteries to honor the foster-father of Jesus. It is a beautiful devotion and one that draws a soul closer to the beloved St. Joseph.

On the crucifix. O Lord, in order to honor St. Joseph as he deserves, Thou hast taken him body and soul to Heaven to Crown him with glory, thus signifying to the world, both visible and invisible, that Thou hast made Joseph Thy foster-father, the supreme steward of all Thy possessions. Large beads. After saying the above prayer,

skip to the large bead and say the following prayer on each of the large beads: We beseech Thee, O Lord, that we may find aid in the merits of the Spouse of Thy Most Holy Mother, so that what we cannot obtain by ourselves may be given us through his intercession, who livest and reignest with God the Father in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God forever and ever. Amen. Small beads. For each decade of small beads: it is customary to meditate on events in the life of Joseph: 1. Betrothal to Mary (Mt 1:18) | 2. Annunciation to Joseph (Mt 1:19-21) | 3. Birth and Naming of Jesus (Mt 1:22-25) | 4. Flight into Egypt (Mt 2:13-15). | 5. Hidden Life at Nazareth (Mt 2:23; Lk 2:51-52). (Other mysteries that can be substituted are the "Finding of Jesus in the Temple," the "Death of St. Joseph" and the "Coronation of St. Joseph in Heaven.") On each small bead the following prayer is recited: Hail Joseph, Son of David, thou whose holiness surpasses that of all Angels and Saints, blessed art thou amongst men, thou who wert chosen to be the Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary of whom was born Jesus. Glorious Saint Joseph, now reigning body and soul in Heaven, protector of the Universal Church, pray for us poor sinners now and at the hour of our death. Amen. Each decade: Completed with a "Glory Be."

This year St. Patrick's Day falls on a Friday and I am mindful that for many in our diocese this is the occasion for festive celebrations. Therefore, I am granting a general dispensation from this Lenten discipline for that Friday, March 17. I would encourage those who



will forego the practice to prayerfully consider some substitution of equal sacrifice, including but not limited to abstaining from meat on another day. Let us not lose focus, amidst all of our celebrations, of the great saint whom we celebrate and the Catholic faith which he brought to the Irish people. Go mbeannaí Dia thú!"



LENTEN REGULATIONS 2023

- 1. Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of abstinence from meat as well as days of fast, when only one full meal is allowed. On days of fast, two other meatless meals may be taken according to one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal.
- 2. The other Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence from meat.
- 3. The obligation to abstain from meat begins at age fourteen (14) and does not cease.
- 4. The obligation to fast begins at age eighteen (18) and ceases at age fifty-nine (59).

Please note: Although the faithful may excuse themselves from fast and abstinence, for a just cause, there is an obligation to substitute another penance in its place. No Catholic should lightly excuse him/herself from these Lenten obligations.

The Stations of the Cross are representations of the path Jesus bore on his way to the crucifixion. They involve Jesus enduring suffering, insults, moments of support, and the intense sacrifice that Christians believe Jesus undertook for human salvation. The object of the Stations is to help the faithful make a pilgrimage (in spirit) to the chief scenes of Christ's sufferings and death. Most simply, they are usually performed during Lent, especially on Good Friday, and are about remembering Christ's suffering for our sake.





MAYO PHARMACY: A CATHOLIC PHARMACY PASSIONATE ABOUT LIFE. Kevin Martian, owner and pharmacist, says,



If someone calls with a prescription for birth control, we just tell them that we don't carry it because we are a Catholic pharmacy.'

When you walk into *Mayo Pharmacy* in Bismarck, North Dakota, you may be taken aback by what you see. Its shelves are not only stocked with vitamins and health goods, but they are also filled with an impressive selection of Catholic religious articles and books.

"The previous owner had a little gift shop at the pharmacy, but when we bought it, my wife Tammy added more to it and improved it," said Kevin Martian, owner and pharmacist, in an interview with the Register. "The Catholic gift shop is part of our mission as a business. Currently, there are no Catholic gift shops in the Bismarck area. We believe it important for one to be in our

community, and we happen to have the space for it, so we do it."

If you venture a little further into the pharmacy, you will find yourself looking in vain for one of the most commonly dispensed pharmaceuticals in America today: artificial birth control.

"If someone calls with a prescription for birth control, we just tell them that we don't carry it because we are a Catholic pharmacy," Martian said. "We try to be respectful and show them Christian love. They are usually pretty understanding, but when we get a prescription for Plan B' — the morning-after pill — there is usually more tension on their side. Overall, I believe it is a supernatural grace that we aren't persecuted more for it. God takes care of us."

The amazing thing is that when Martian graduated from North Dakota State University with a bachelor's degree in pharmaceutical science and a doctoral degree in pharmacy in 2011, running a pro-life pharmacy of his own wasn't even "on his radar."

Apparently, however, God had other designs in mind for Martian and his career, and it would just take some time for them to all pan out.

"Around that time, Tammy and I really wanted to become natural family planning (NFP) instructors for the Couple to Couple League," he recalled. "To do so, we had to sign a statement that said we promised to have no cooperation with artificial birth control whatsoever. I said to myself, 'I can't sign this!' So I called them up and explained that I was going to be a pharmacist and I'd have to dispense it."

Thanks to the strong convictions of the Couple to Couple League, however, Martian wasn't let off the hook.

"They wouldn't budge or bend the rules for me, and it rubbed me the wrong way," he said. "The president even called me and asked me to train, but said they couldn't let me teach if I was going to be dispensing birth control. At the time, I thought they were going too far, but now when I look back, I am very grateful for what they did."

With the help of God's providential wisdom and grace, another path was laid out for Martian after he encountered this roadblock.

"On my lunch break, I would usually call Tammy and then listen to Catholic radio, but one day, I just turned the radio on without calling her first," he said. "Then I was so surprised to hear Tammy call in to the <u>Doctor Is In</u> [on EWTN Radio] and say that her husband was going to be a pharmacist and ask what he should do about birth control. The host just simply said, I don't know what he should do, but if you just pray, God will find a job for him.' I was mad at him for saying that. It just seemed too simple, like he didn't understand."

Nevertheless, his faith-filled response prompted Martian to call the National Bioethics Center; and, amazingly, he was connected directly to Father Tad Pacholczyk, one of the world's foremost Catholic bioethicists.

"I don't even think he normally takes calls, but he took the time to talk to me for 30 minutes," Martian said. "He totally knocked me off my feet, and I knew my life was never going to be the same. Afterwards, I really started praying about it and told God I would trust in him."

Soon after that, he found himself at a career fair in Fargo, North Dakota, trying to dodge a wholesale distributor who was approaching him. Our pharmacy does just fine without it," he said. "We are satisfied with how our business is doing. We have remodeled twice and extended our space. We are adding in other Catholic employees and are planning on expanding our services to serve our community."

AND MORE.

"I didn't feel like talking to him, but, thankfully, he pursued me and asked me if I was interested in opening up my own pharmacy," he explained. "I told him, I suppose so' since I didn't know what else to do because I didn't want to dispense birth control. He said, I have a client in Bismarck, North Dakota, who believes the same thing.' I was totally amazed. I had never even realized that there was a pro-life pharmacy next to my hometown. The way God provided me the information was incredible!"

One open door led to another, and Martian eventually found himself working at Mayo Pharmacy.

"At first, he didn't have a job for me, but then one just happened to open up," he said of Daniel Mayo, the pro-life pharmacist and namesake of Mayo Pharmacy. "Since 1993, the owner had held a personal conviction not to carry birth control. I began to share his convictions more and more. I cannot dispense it in good conscience, knowing how it has facilitated the use of women and of people using each other sexually. It destroys relationships and has been such a terrible thing for our culture on a moral level."

Today, Martian has found that holding to these strong convictions is actually not hindering his business financially or socially at all. In fact, those who know Martian can vouch for what a tremendous blessing his pharmacy is in the local community and beyond.

"Of all the businesses in Bismarck, I just can't say enough about Mayo Pharmacy," said longtime customer Mike Conlin. "It epitomizes what our Catholic faith is all about. Kevin has attracted employees who believe in what he believes in and who express their Christian love on a daily basis. His statement is pro-life, pro-woman and pro-family, and he lives up to it. The type of operation he runs is very much needed in our community. It is helping keep Christianity alive around here."

According to Father Wayne Sattler, pastor of St. Anne Catholic Church in Bismarck, the pharmacy is about far more than dispensing pharmaceuticals.

"I have come to know Kevin as both my pharmacist and brother in Christ," Father Sattler said. "When you enter Mayo Pharmacy, it is apparent that it is clearly not a drug store. It is a committed effort to assist the well-being of the human person: body, mind and soul. Although one would typically first come there with concern to their body and having their prescription filled, what they will first encounter is actually the pharmacy's concern for their soul by the presence of a full religious bookstore in their foyer."

By working as a team, they further the cause of life in an extraordinary way.



"This care for their soul and mind is then carried forth through the hearts of the staff Kevin has attracted to this mission," Father Sattler observed. "I say 'mission' with emphasis, for the fact that Mayo Pharmacy does not fill prescriptions for birth control is simply consistent with their commitment to the true well-being of the whole person. It takes courage to do what is truly best for the human person. Kevin and his staff stand as an inspiration to what the world around us can and should look like when our commitment to Christ and his gospel of life is consistent and seamless."

In an article titled "Contraception: Fatal to the Faith," renowned theologian and Servant of God Father John Hardon stated, "The grave sinfulness of contraception is taught infallibly by the Church's ordinary universal teaching authority."

The Catechism of the Catholic Church instructs that contraception is "intrinsically evil."

When asked how he would encourage other pharmacists who are considering taking a fully pro-life approach, Martian had some helpful advice to share:

"I would tell them to contact the National Catholic Bioethics Center and visit their website at NCBCenter.org. I would also say to truly pray about it and trust that God will take care of them. It will be a challenge, but depending on their scenario, they may be surprised how well their employer will accommodate their convictions. Just like that Catholic radio host said to my wife, if you pray about it, God will provide. Don't put him in a box."
